- International Research Forum: describes the presenters' research in relation to learning, libraries and literacies. (Both of the above will be included in published proceedings.)
- Workshops/demonstrations: these feature one or more leaders working with a group to help them develop skills in a specific teaching or research technique.
- **Poster Session:** Description of practice or theory presented visually. Presenter to attend to answer questions for a specified period of time.

All proposals will be independently reviewed before acceptance. The review panel for the International Research Forum will be drawn from IASL members worldwide. Successful applicants will be advised in writing by 18th December 2000.

- Conclusions (may be preliminary)

#### Professional Papers must, in addition to information overleaf, include on a separate page:

- Title of paper
- Detailed description outlining paper content and relevance to professional practice (approx 500 words).
